10 Reasons why you should do IPE



**10. Hear some cool new accents.** One of the highlights from my trip was definitely the fun times I had comparing accents with the other participants. There were people from Canada, the US, New Zealand, Australia and Hong Kong, so it could get pretty confusing at times. We had a good laugh every time we found out there could be 5 different ways of saying the same thing! I also discovered that it could get tricky when you want to order food in public places. Besides, who doesn't love a great Aussie accent?

**9. Change your scenery.** Sure, Canada is pretty great, but wouldn't it be amazing to go hiking in the Noosa National Park, go to the beach on the gold coast, travel through the Outback, or go on a discovery tour to Fraser Island? I got to do all those things and more, and saw such a variety of nature from enormous trees, to tropical flowers, to beautiful waterfalls!



**8. See some interesting wildlife.** I'm sure you have all heard stories about kangaroos parading around town and spotting koalas in eucalyptus trees at every turn, which isn't far off! We had no shortage of animal sightings during the trip from all the bus rides through the countryside, our hack through the 3\* XC course in Warwick, and our visit to the zoo where we got to see crocodiles, Tasmanian devils, and a wide variety of snakes. We even saw a couple dingoes on Fraser Island!

**7. Learn or try something new!** During our trip, we had so many amazing opportunities to learn about the Aussie way of doing things. We got to see everything from how they train security dogs, to race horse rehabilitation (I got to see a horse gallop on a treadmill and swim in a pool!), to how they make stock saddles! There is so much out there to discover!



**6. Gain some perspective.** Travelling to a new part of the world can be a real eye opening experience...you may see things you had never imagined! I absolutely loved every second of my trip and I would do it again in a heartbeat; however there were times when I really found the change in culture to be a challenge. These times really make you thankful for everything you have back home, so this may be a trip of a lifetime for you!

**5.** Ride some really nice horses! Throughout the course of the trip, I got to ride a total of 4 days. It may not sound like a lot, but it was because the time was mainly focused on the exchange experience (which overall, was better in my opinion). We first competed in mixed teams for the Kangaroo Cup, which was located at a local Pony Club Branch's barn in Gold Coast. It had the format of a combined test (dressage and show jumping) and was a really great way to get to know the other participants straight away. We then got to go on an amazing hack through the 3\* course in Warwick. It was so neat to see the huge jumps and learn about their different Eventing levels system. Finally, we ended the trip with the Nation's Cup in Noosa, which was a show jumping competition!

It is unbelievable for me to think that I would have a good friend to stay with if I ever chose to travel to Hong Kong or New Zealand! On top of it all, I made one of my best friends, Eleanor, on this trip, and now we even attend Queen's University together! How's that for a coincidence!

# 2013 National Quiz-British Columbia Islands

You meet new friends from across the country that share the same horse loving passion and need for knowledge, and at the same time, you get to see so many amazing features and land marks of this incredible country. It is also one of the less expensive National events since there is no riding and anyone who is dedicated (which is all of you!) can qualify!

This year, National Quiz was held in the British Columbia Islands region in the beautiful city of Victoria. SLOV only had five members competing this year. On the C team of three we had, Sarah and Rachel de Kroon, and Kendra Zimmerman. The C division is always the largest; 50+ individuals, and 14+ teams. Joining an A/B scramble team, in one of the biggest showings for this level (8 teams, 32 individuals), from BCI was myself, Melissa Bayer. Lastly, one of only three affiliates this year, was Carolyn Wight. Friday October 11<sup>th</sup> was the day competitors arrive and register, receiving any cool "Quiz wear" they ordered (The hoodies are always the best and handy for the flight home). Following this are fun "ice breaker" activities which allow you to start making some pretty amazing new friends. Your team photos are taken on this night, and they can be as serious or as silly as you'd like! It's to bed early because while you may be battling time difference, you still have to be up bright and early to get your breakfast and be fully awake before the written test!

This year, the SLOV team did amazingly on their written test and this being weighted the heaviest of the two phases, really helped secure a high spot in their individual rankings! The Visual tables this year were very challenging. A little tip to those aspiring to go to nationals, or maybe want a hint to next year's regional quiz; Study your plants! This seems to always show up on the visual tables. That and every kind of tack you can dream of! There was a lot of western tack, a little different from past years. The results here really sorted out who knew their stuff, and who didn't. SLOV still held their high rankings! The activity planned for Saturday night was a ghost walk of the city. Apparently Victoria is one of the most haunted cities in North America. A tour guide led the groups around the city, explaining the stories behind the haunting.

Sunday morning, up early again to have a large very delicious breakfast before the best part of quiz began; the games!! Even though it is still very much part of the competition, there is very little stress heading into them. Your sides usually hurt by the end from laughing so much. The energy in the room is phenomenal! Every one, no matter how tired you are, or how nervous you are, ends up very excited and into the games. This year, there were mainly 'board game' type styles, with a modified version of Snakes and Ladders, and Jeopardy type games. They were still very fun, and of course there was moving games like 'Headbandz', Pictionary and "Smooth Moves" where you worked in pairs to act out various movements a horse can perform. As usual, the games went by far too quick, but we were in for a real treat after. You had the opportunity to sign up (for a small additional cost) to go whale watching on Sunday afternoon! We were out on the water for three hours and saw four humpback whales, and four kinds of seals! It was an incredible experience.


Sunday night is the semi-formal banquet. We all came back from the whale watching with red cheeks and windswept hair, and in under an hour got all prettied up to enjoy a incredible Thanksgiving buffet dinner, and the awards ceremony. This year, two teams from the United States came up to give the C teams a chance to compete in the North American Challenge.

This is a special opportunity. During the written test, there is a separate test that quizzes your knowledge of your country's club. The best score from each "region" of Canada gets to make up the Canadian 'NAC' team and they answer more questions at the banquet in front of everyone. This year, Canada beat the US again!

SLOV had an amazing group this year. The C team placed **second** out of fifteen teams! Sarah placed 4<sup>th</sup> individually, Kendra finished 10<sup>th</sup>, and Rachel 13<sup>th</sup> out of 57! The A/B team came 5<sup>th</sup> out of 8 teams, and I placed 5<sup>th</sup> out of 32 individually. Carolyn finished 2<sup>nd</sup> out of 3 in a very competitive affiliate division. Afterwards, they held a dance, which was so much fun, a great way to let all that stress out after a very challenging weekend.

Having now been to four National quizzes, it is by far a favourite National Event. The places you get to see, the people you meet, and the friends you make from across the country, it's incredible! The only way to get a chance to compete on the national scale and show the rest of the country how awesome SLOV is, is to go to our Regional Quiz! The more experience you have at the regional quiz, the more you will have seen before going to Nationals and will have a better idea of what may be on the test or visuals. You will also have lots of invaluable study material! Keep your old tests! If you are 12 years or older, and are ready to compete level 5 or 6 at our regional quiz, you could have the chance to show the rest of Canada just how smart you are at the 2014 National Quiz in Winnipeg, Manitoba!
