

Features	Safe area.				
Equipment	Station number; reference chart for station judge.				
Aim	Highlighting the calmness, obedience and willingness of the horse and the knowledge of the rider.				
Important points to look for	Calmness, obedience and willingness of horse to stand. A regard for safety on part of rider.				
Faults to be avoided	Refusal of horse to stand. Dangerous conduct on the part of horse or rider. Lack of knowledge on part of rider				
Elimination	For safety, inability to control horse.				
<p>Faults 0 – Accomplished, horse stood, five boots named correctly. Faults 1 – One failed attempt: one boot incorrectly not named. Faults 2 – Two failed attempts: two boots incorrectly or not named. Faults 3 – Three failed attempts: three boots incorrectly or not named. Excellent: completed on first attempt with confidence, ease, familiarity and effortlessly with complete control of horse. Very Good: completed on first attempt with effort, concentration, attention and extra effort to control horse or to name parts. Good: completed with repeated effort Average: partially completed with repeated effort Poor: little effort applied to task Bad: little interest or effort applied to task</p>
