### 1.5 Message from the Chair

The last six months since the April AGM meetings in Winnipeg have just flown by. There have been high points and low points but certainly a great deal has been achieved during that time.

At the beginning of June, I attended a 50-year branch celebration for the Clearwater Pony Club in my region. This was a very uplifting experience, and it was fantastic to meet the original DC from that time and hear a few of her amazing experiences. There was a lot of very interesting memorabilia to look at and many of the original founding members were also able to attend and share their stories with the other guests. It truly was wonderful to hear positive and uplifting stories and experiences that the members past and present shared about their time with the Canadian Pony Club. I also wrote a welcome letter for a group in Saskatchewan who were also celebrating their 50 years with Pony Club. I was invited to attend but sadly I was unable due to conflicting prior engagements.



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In August, Kim Leffley and I headed to the UK for the board meetings of the PCIA. For those of you not familiar with the acronym, it stands for Pony Club International Alliance. Traditionally these face to face meetings with the National heads of other worldwide Pony Clubs have been hosted in either the United States or Canada. The UK asked to host with the intention of making our ad-hoc group a formal entity, with a proper charter and written international rules that will apply to all participating pony clubs across the globe. Canada, the USA the UK, Ireland and Australia were all represented in person at the meetings, so with great ceremony, I signed The Charter on behalf of Canada. The original was then to be couriered around the globe for the other nations to sign.

The minutes from the meetings will be circulated to you (the UK secretary was not a patch on Val as a minute taker!) so that you can see the topics discussed. Canada has now returned to the International Tetrathlon exchange with our hosting of the competition to take place in 2026. International Quiz was a big hit when we hosted in 2017. Such a big hit, that the members that came from Australia and the UK and participated in our 2017 Quiz, campaigned to have an International Quiz every other year. It was agreed that all exchanges would be played following host country rules. The UK will be celebrating 90 years as a pony club in 2019, and to celebrate this big event there will be a celebration that will echo across the world. On August 3 at noon (local time wherever you are) we are invited to participate in these celebrations. The UK has commissioned special music created for this event (which they will share with everyone) and we can Facebook Live or use some other social media to share our experiences in a similar way that New Year is celebrated coast to coast. More details to follow. Each of the nations at the meeting was given tasks to complete before the next meeting (a GoTo meeting) in February. Our task is to work with the US to create a handbook for International Coaches and Chaperones. The Australians have been given the task of creating a Universal Disciplinary Policy with input from all other nations. A great deal was achieved in our 4 days of meetings and our final day was spent at a hugely popular Centre not too far away. In total the UK has 465 Centres accounting for 13,000 members!

At the end of our stay in the UK, Kim and I were able to attend the International Mounted Games Exchange taking place in the grounds of Cholmondley Castle. What an experience to see the UK Pony Club National Championships and admire their marketing skills and sponsorship that they had in place! Kim and I cheered our Canadian Team with much gusto. The next face to face PCIA meeting will be hosted by Australia in 2020, and we will be the hosts in 2022.

The serious work of creating a viable Strategic Plan for the future of Pony Club in Canada has taken up much of my time since then, as our team meetings went from monthly to weekly. The SP committee has worked long and hard to bring you a viable plan that will hopefully ensure that we continue to exist to educate future generations of pony clubbers in Canada. We need to engage, stabilize and grow our membership. The future of the Canadian Pony Club lies in our hands and we can only achieve this as a team effort. We all need to move forward working together in harmony.



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That statement brings me to the low points of the year. Conflicts are unfortunately still occupying a great deal of my time; it's inevitable that we cannot always get along with each other, and that we sometimes let our emotions get the better of us. Kim brought something that she had read, to the attention of the SP committee which I would like to share with you.

You *are* allowed to have whatever *emotions* you want. No one can control your emotions. Emotions are healthy responses to things.

You are *not* allowed to have *behaviors* that are harmful just because you have certain emotions. Your behaviors are what you can control, and they are far easier to control than your emotions.

There will always be conflict and differences of opinion; it's how we go about resolving those conflicts that makes the difference.

Should I be re-elected as your National Chair, I will continue to put my heart and soul into the job. I am a "Pony Club for life" person who truly believes that what we have is worth fighting for. I hope that you all agree with me and that we can work together to achieve our goals.

#### International Mounted Games Exchange

Canada sent a full team of riders to IMGE in the UK August 4-19.

In the eleventh-hour Gabrielle Shank, our alternate, was able to fly out and join the team Saturday for one practice prior to departing for the UK.

The Exchange itself was a wonderful trip and all our members enjoyed their time away. The Canadian Team represented us well and was wonderful to travel with. All our members were polite and helpful and were always punctual and adaptable. We were often lost while on tour and we appreciated everyone's good humour. Our members participated in everything despite the fact that many of the activities involved heights and were extreme in nature. The hosts were all wonderful and our members enjoyed getting to know other pony club families as well as participating in their cultural activities.



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Canada competed well at the Championships and finished off third overall. In the future we will be updating the packing list to better identify things members will need while on tour. This will be available on the website so that members looking to qualify in future years will have an idea of the things they will need. We will also be providing a document for future Team Manager and Coach to better equip them with the tools and items they will need to have a successful exchange.

### International Competition

This year, with the support of Canadian Pony Club, we were able to send Erik Zimmerman as a senior male to compete on a mixed male team with the USA. Below is Erik Zimmerman's report.

"The International Exchange for Tetrathlon, hosted in the United States from July 13-July 30, was one of the best experiences I have ever had. I had a great time meeting and becoming friends with all the other competitors from Australia, the US, United Kingdom, and Ireland. The Tourism aspect of the exchange was very well put together with a good balance of scheduled activities and free time to explore the towns we were staying in. The week and a half leading up to the competition was full of activities such as going to the US National Whitewater Center as well as helping out a local therapeutic riding center with some chores for a day. Along with all the fun times we had as a group in the United States, there was also plenty of time to keep our training up with scheduled pool times about three times a week as well as plenty of time to run in the mornings and evenings. Because of the state regulations we had to go to shooting ranges for us to practice with the air pistols, which worked out fine and gave us easily enough practice before competing. Although the US Pony Club does not do



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Cross Country as part of their Tetrathlon we still got to do a Cross Country round at one of the local barns before competing.

The International Competition was held at the same time as USPC's Championships East at Tryon Equestrian Center, which is a beautiful facility in North Carolina. All of the phases went off without too much headache and all of the athletes performed amazingly over the three days of Riding, Running, Shooting, and Swimming. All of the horses were amazing, and the courses were very well made with good challenges and interesting jumps.

I personally got second place for the Riding phase, and the World team of two American boys, one Irish boy, and myself placed third! Canada is now officially back on the rotation for International Tetrathlon, so hopefully in two years' time we will be able to qualify and send a full team of four boys and four girls to the United Kingdom!" by Erik Zimmerman.

The CPC Education Facebook page continues to get a lot of traffic. There has been some conversation about making this page open to the public. That is definitely a consideration.

This year we have re-worked the scholarships and developed a new scholarship to be offered to members who haven't pursued upper level testing but are still active and contributing members of CPC. I am anticipating an increase in applications.

In the spring I wrote and submitted a draft letter to be used to approach school districts to consider including Canadian Pony Club materials in their programs. A small committee I was on had a number of meetings with Langley School District (in the BCLM region) who run an Equestrian Academy. A number of years ago they had approached BCLM Pony Club in the genesis of their program as they were interested in using the CPC program; again this year they were interested in using the program, but my understanding is that at this point they are just referring program participants to individual branches in the area.



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Earlier this year I served on a small committee that was looking at implementing some changes to Testing Procedures especially in the areas of Conditioning and Teeth. As a result of these upcoming changes, as well as other tweaks that have occurred over the intervening years, the Workbooks and Study Guides will have to be updated.

All in all, it has been another fruitful year, and again I extend my heartiest thanks to our Regional Education Chairs and their committee for continued excellence in their deliveries of our program.

In addition to the education portion of the weekend, DC's, ADC's and treasurers had a presentation of their own to discuss Conflict Management. The group strategized on how to reduce conflict through improved communication.

The Region has continued with the Junior Instructors Program in an effort to promote good instruction within Pony Club. Several members in the Region banked hours towards instruction and we look forward to continued work on this program.



Regional Quiz which was held April 21, 2018 at the Bearspaw Lifestyle Centre west of Calgary. All levels from Snurf through Senior were represented including a couple of Horsemasters there to test their knowledge.

Members qualifying from the Intermediate and Senior levels travelled to Ottawa, Ontario over the Thanksgiving weekend in October to attend National Quiz. ABS sent a team in each of the Senior and Intermediate divisions. Lots of great memories and outstanding placings were celebrated on their return.



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We started off spring with a bang by hosting a Show Jumping Clinic with Pony Club Alumni Sandra Donnelly. The clinic hosted sessions for members of all levels and it was a great way to start of the regional events for year. This would be the first of three regional clinics. High Level Dressage with Janine Little in Strathmore and a Cross Country Clinic in Cochrane with Leahona Rowland rounding out our offerings for the year.

The region hosted our annual Examiner and Test Rep Clinic in Delacour in May to ensure that all of our Examiners and Test Reps were well positioned for the coming rounds of testing.

Continuing into July, ABS sent three qualifying members to the National Dressage Competition. Jessica Hanson competed at training level, Teagan Williams attended for First Level and Rachel Glatt competed in Second Level. The whole crew represented Alberta South Region at Essa, Ontario and had a great time.



For the first time in many years the Alberta South Region hosted a qualifier to send a team to National Rally. We ended up qualifying riders for two teams, one at Entry Level and one at Pre-Training and sent full teams, including grooms and captains for both. Both teams did very well and our Pre-Training Team consisting of Carlie Wells, Teagan Williams, Emily Marston (captain) and Rebecca Anderson (groom) ended up in 1ST place overall, while our Entry Level Team walked away with a respectable 3RD place finish.

Congrats to ALL our members attending National events, not only for their outstanding achievements but for maintaining a high level of Character, Sportsmanship and Loyalty while representing our Region at these National events.

As in the past, the year progressed with many great showings and fun events for the members to attend. ABC Camp, Regional Schooling Shows, Finals and Medals. Moving both Finals and Medals closer to Calgary saw a marked increase in attendance for both events.

Their June Regional Show-jumping Championships are always worth the effort both as Organizers and as Participants. The prospect of more access/inclusion for other members in their Summer Camps is something that other Island Chapters have consistently requested.
- Saltspring's club has now been inactive for 3 years and doesn't seem to be re-energizing. In spite of that, Becki Mason continues to be involved in BCIS activities, supporting the Greater Victoria club and continuing her involvement as an occasional coach and Examiner. The Region would do well to contact Louise and Samantha and request that any remaining Assets of the Saltspring Chapter be re-claimed by the Region.

After some challenging experiences at National Level events this year, the Region is exploring expanding participation with our Neighbouring Region - hoping to build its relationship with BCLM through participation in their Quiz Event (by gracious invitation) and possibly re-visiting attending BCLM Rally after a hiatus in 2018.

Avalon having closed in 2017, the most central and comprehensive training facility for Eventing on the Island has shifted to “Hi-Point” in the Cowichan Valley, however there is also a community facility that has been developed in Campbell River. Unfortunately, the fact remains that with the closure of Avalon to the Public and no Island-based “Horse Trials Event” there has been a dis-appointing loss of capacity for the Vancouver Island Eventing Rider Community.

Although Hi-Point has the terrain and similar overall size, they have elected to keep the Eventing Training area limited in scope to allow them to continue to develop other mixed-farming opportunities on their property. Their Indoor, however, remains very well-appointed, and Regional Testing was held there for the first time in the Fall of 2018, with 4 candidates succeeding in completing their tested levels: 1 C2 SM and Flat Ride; 2 completed their C2 (over fences); 1 completed B (Flat Ride.)

### **3.6 Central Ontario Region**



Central Ontario Region continued on its steady way in 2018 with and “every member counts” approach. Membership numbers rose modestly in 2018 over the previous two years, and we know that retention is not a concern – shown by fewer new members and several members receiving their 10-year pins. Attracting new members – even if it takes a road trip six hours north to Algoma as we did this year! - will continue to be an important goal.

The COR committee took on a membership survey in 2018 to help with planning, which received 70 responses. Key take-aways include:

- 40% being involved for more than 6 years
- “competition” and “fun” were the top two responses for “favourite thing about Pony Club”
- the majority of respondents like to receive education at the branch level
- top education topics include First Aid, Equine Health & Wellness, and Feed & Nutrition
- “enjoy the challenges” was a top response for continuing in testing
- 85% of respondents participate in mounted Pony Club competition, and most ranked “fun, inexpensive and local” as an important factor for taking part

- ➔ Some traction was gained in regional education opportunities, with hands-on, barn-hosted sessions paired twice with regional meetings. Attendance was quite good for both sessions. The popular weekend-long Working Rally (shipping into a dorm-style camp) continues as a hallmark initiative, with the annual spring session being built on with a new fall session this past year.
- ➔ Overall testing numbers were "up" in 2018, especially at the D level. Testing was added to the new fall Working Rally event and was well-received.
- ➔ Competitions remained steady in 2018, although hosts are finding it challenging to accommodate our keen riders in lower numbers. A combined show day for Show Jumping and Dressage has proved successful for qualifiers and remained the model for finals again in 2018.
- ➔ COR had Nationals candidates in Quiz, PPGs, Jumping, Tetrathlon, and at Dressage which we hosted; it was a highlight in our regional calendar, having included a visit from Olympian eventer Jessica Phoenix!

The December Annual General Meeting brought several new faces to the regional executive and the committee table. COR welcomed a centre in late 2018 and we look forward to a solid partnership there. And, the region's conference committee is at it again with plans for the February 2019 Youth Education Conference.

Together, COR volunteers will continue to promote Pony Club for all it's worth, while members and their families look forward to continued opportunities for our young equestrians.

Regional Show Jumping was scheduled to be hosted by Avon and held in Windsor on Saturday, August 18. The hosting branch due to some executive difficulties could not host the event as per arrangement. West Valley did attempt to get another date and host the event...but it was a not a realization for 2018.

We hope to have this event scheduled into the 2019 season.

#### **National Show Jumping**

The CPC National Show Jumping competition was hosted in the Western Ontario Region (WOR) on August 23-26th, 2018 at the Iron Horse Equestrian Complex Burlington, Ont.

The NS candidate attending the event was Victoria Mastin and her chaperone was her mother Lorna

There were 9 members in attendance and Victoria placed 8<sup>th</sup> overall.

Congratulations Victoria!!



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### 3.9 Saint Lawrence and Ottawa Valley Region

Scheduling regional events has proven to be somewhat of a challenge, mainly due to participation by members in multiple show circuits that conflict with possible event dates. This seemed to be improved upon this year, however, by scheduling activities as early as possible in the year. This made it possible to run all regional events this year where several did not run last year, chiefly as a result of booking the activities too late which contributed to low member sign-ups. It is important to book these activities as early in the year as possible going forward, so that members are aware of the dates and advance planning can occur.

Through considerable effort (primarily on the part of Cat Hunter) we have been able to add to our previously dwindling membership through the addition of several new branches; however, there have been some challenges engaging these new members in regional activities, and interest for some branches has wavered. We need to revisit ways to get new branches and their members to buy in to regional events.

In particular, there were some challenges with changes to one of our (new) primary locations for activities (Pinecrest Farm – home of Merrickville Masters, change in management and shift in location for this club, as well as change in leadership for the branch, led to issues setting up membership and scheduling activities).

Would have liked to have had more fundraising activities – several planned events weren't able to be orchestrated due to the aforementioned facility issues/changes.

We are fortunate to have stalwart promoters of Pony Club (in Diana Bayer and Susan Lorden) who continue to promote the club at local fairs and events. Their locations, at opposite ends of the region, provide the opportunity for exposure in different areas. It would be nice to see more of the members themselves out promoting PC as a means of showcasing the organization and contributing to a positive image of the club.

Rally was limited to a one-day event due to low numbers, but those in attendance seemed to appreciate the schedule and activities provided. This will likely not be a format that is relied upon going forward, but it is good to know that it is possible to provide an enjoyable rally experience for members using this model if need-be.

Winter Camp and Quiz continue to be fairly popular events, but it is still a challenge to run some of the mounted activities with members not owning their own ponies. Regional Tetrathlon continues to be fairly well attended as well, highlighting the importance of providing variety for members in the activities they are offered.

Regional SJ and Dressage were run together this year and this format seemed to be well received – we will likely continue this going forward.



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We are fortunate to have had the ongoing efforts of excellent Testing Chairs (Katiana Fleck and Anne-Marie Duarte) who managed to orchestrate successful regional testing. Regional Testing seems to continually present inherent challenges which our test chairs managed to navigate, with the board’s input (e.g., dealing with damage to testing facility, expectations for members who withdraw from testing). A number of issues have been raised with respect to existing regulations/guidelines for testing, and the test chairs have presented some innovative ideas for handling these issues that can be utilized and expanded on in future years.

### 3.10 Western Ontario Region

Membership was at 212 in 14 branches. We introduced 1 new riding centre in 2018 and lost one as well. We also had 8 horse masters in our region. So total membership of 220.

### **4.3 Equestrian Canada**

*Report submitted by Kim Leffley, EC Liaison*

In our ongoing efforts to create better connection with EC, we have continued to reach out to its seemingly ever-changing personnel to try to build bridges and find connecting points that can serve both organizations.

After a few years of organizational chaos and bad press, EC has had a year of relative stability and we (CPC) have been able to forge connections with some of their members. In April, on your behalf I attended their Annual Convention in Ottawa and through the efforts of Charles Cue (our Ombudsman and EC Board member in charge of Governance) was able to meet face to face with new President Meg Kreuger and CEO Richard Mongeau. We discussed the disenfranchisement of Pony Club and our desire to work together rather than in opposition to one another. I was asked (first there, and other times subsequently) what we hoped to gain through affiliation with EC, and correspondingly, what we felt we bring to the table. We discussed the strength of our education program and group learning model, and how PC might fit into the LTED model. We also discussed their governance structure and how it offered no functional niche for orgs such as ours, 4H, Cantra or any other Canadian equestrian org not offering EC programming or not Breed or PSO related. They expressed that they are reviewing this information and invited me to sit on the Category C (National Equine Organizations) committee. As we are currently categorized as a "Special Interest Affiliate" we have no vote, but at least our voice is now represented as I also now represent CPC on the monthly Cat C calls. I am hoping our membership figures might also give us a seat on the EIDC (Equine Industry Development Committee).

All this having been said, at this meeting they revealed the Rookie Rider program and presented a new LTED pathway manual which gave brief mention to Pony Club but did not represent us in any way in the actual structure and pathway. I noted our disappointment in this and in a recent Cat C call where one member of another organization challenged our "right" to be part of this category, CEO Richard Mongeau reiterated the need to re-examine the categories to better reflect the nature of all equine organizations in Canada, and noted one area he saw potential for CPC to be actively involved in was review and comment on the LTED program. I am still waiting to hear how this will play out.

Communication continues to be a challenge as in June we responded to a request for feedback on some ideas EC presented, and also invited them to attend/participate in our National Quiz (held



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conveniently in Ottawa) to increase their understanding of our level of education. After two further followups to which no reply was received, I again forwarded an inquiry to Liz Saunders (the only EC person who has consistently lobbied for us) and asked if EC was committed to inclusion of CPC in the face of the evidence otherwise. She expressed disappointment at how we had been sidelined and indicated she would be taking the letter to the Board for awareness and discussion. Subsequent to that I received a communication from Meg Kreuger apologizing for the delay in response and reaffirming their desire to continue to work with CPC in forming a stronger partnership.

In summary - although EC continues to face challenges relating to the repair of the damage done over the past 2-3 years, it is my belief that they are interested in finding ways to be more inclusive of equestrian orgs who don't fit into their current structure, and to form strategic partnerships with those orgs. Their new commitment to attendance of previously disregarded general industry gatherings (ie - Equine Guelph Equine Symposium) seems to bear out their interest in sensing the true pulse of the Canadian equestrian community. In my opinion, the challenge will be this: *Because EC offers their own programming in addition to their purported role as an overseer and advocate for ALL equestrian activity in Canada, they automatically find themselves in a position of conflict of interest as both a stakeholder (responsible to make decisions which further their success and profitability) and regulator (making decisions to further the visibility and success of all equestrian organizations they represent). This is a mutually exclusive tension and will pose a not insignificant hurdle in how our organization is integrated into and represented by EC.*

Dialogue continues on these and other matters of interest to both EC and CPC (including the question and practicalities of "equivalency"). I continue to believe that with the ongoing improvement in their own structures, attendance to convention and participation in these Category calls and discussions serve to keep us in front of the parties involved and give us the best chance at building a workable, mutually beneficial partnership with EC rather than winding up an underfunded, underrepresented competitor to them.

### **4.4 Information Technology**

*Report submitted by Ian MacLean, IT committee chair*

As requested at the April 2018 Board meeting, the IT Committee has drafted Canadian Pony Club Information Technology Policies.

The national IT policy, which applies to national data and systems, includes specifications for the creation, storage and backup of data as well as general requirements for systems development. The previous website policy has been merged into the new IT policy.

Regions and branches may have little or no IT expertise. Consequently, a separate, simpler IT policy has been drafted for them.

Still to be added (if needed) is a policy covering CPC social media.



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### **4.5 Marketing**

*Report submitted by Nancy Codlin, Marketing committee chair*

The sponsorship program is slow however we have a few sponsors that are totally supporting CPC.

Sponsors do not have to be just equestrian related, banks, real estate etc. are most welcome. Any company that would benefit from advertising within our membership.

Jessica Phoenix presented us with a check for \$440 at the National Dressage Show. This payment is number 1 (July) and proceeds will be paid twice a year (December), if members use the code when purchasing a copy of RISE. It was a thrill for riders to meet her, the author and the publicist. This program is still on the web for additional sales.

Tipperary Equestrian donated two helmets again at the National Dressage event. One each for a groom and a rider. The groom has never cashed or contacted me to get the prize.

Two of our sponsors supplied prizes for a National event. These were shipped out with the Region paying for shipping.

We have had a \$100.00 donation in honour of an Alumni that is a HM and had a successful dressage show, within WOR. Nice to see folks think of us when making a donation.

CPC has an in-kind contract with Hoofbeats a company out of the University of Guelph. Six free broadcasting sessions for a sponsorship on our web. These are listed on the web and can be heard there. Two podcasts have been aired with 4 more to come.

### **4.6 Membership**

For 2018, we ended the year with 1874 Active Members and 166 Horsemaster Members for a total of 2040. That is down 25 members from 2017. While this might not seem to be a very significant loss, we had 613 new members join Pony Club in the same time frame.



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
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
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


Membership continues to fall but is being helped by a growing number of Horsemasters Members.

The Horsemaster Program began in 2015 as a pilot project. In its first year, there were 65 members. The total has grown each year and we now stand at 166 HM members for 2018.



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
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### 4.7 Royal Agricultural Winter Fair

### 4.9 Western Pilot

The western pilot seems to be well received so far. Feedback has been minimal from outside of the working committee, and limited to semantics, but those comments are appreciated and are being incorporated into the program updates.

There has been a pilot test/examiners session in WOR, and early reports say it went well, but the full report is still in progress. There are also videos and images being prepared, which will help guide examiners as to the standards for each level. This information will end up being a manual of sorts for examiners and coaches, as well as the basis for a handbook/manual for members.

Last year I had some early discussions with Susan E. Harris about developing a western supplement, however communication from her has ceased since the AGM. I will continue to pursue that casually, but there are internal resources who are ready and willing to put something usable together, and I'm not about to squash their enthusiasm.

For this fall, we have decided to limit the changes to wording only. The *trots* will go back to *jogs*, and only two hands on reins will be permitted at D and D1 level.

Once all the brilliant ideas are fleshed out, if the working group deems them important enough to roll out for next year, they will be submitted through both the Testing and Management committees. Otherwise, the program will remain as it is for the 2019 testing season, and any changes major changes will wait until the SAM next year to allow the winter for members to become familiar with the updates before they're tested on them.

One item that was brought up was the option to MLT western members who are currently in the regular stream but wish to either switch to western (hypothetically) or as is currently being requested, catch up to their English level and test both streams. Regardless, any incoming members who are riding at above a D level should have the option for a MLFT in the western stream – so a MLT sheet will be created for use in 2019.



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My preference is to wait on expanding into the C levels until we have made it through a full year testing at the D levels to work out any kinks as they may arise. That will mean C and C1 testing will have to wait until at least 2020.

### 4.10 Youth Reps

#### National Pony Club Day 2018

This was the 3rd year we had National Pony Club Day! Members, alumni and volunteers supported the event. This year we had social media posts and had Facebook profile picture frames, which are popular!



#### Youth Meetings

We held two youth meetings at National Quiz again this year; one for youth reps and one for all members in attendance. For the youth rep meeting, we had Regional Youth Reps from SK, MB, ABS, SLOV, ANR, BCIN & NS attended. For the annual youth meeting, we assembled a PowerPoint which informed members on upcoming news like the western pilot project, active member applications, scholarships and national pony club day. We did try something new this year is we presented the members with a list of questions to get their answers and feedback on. Members were able to answer these questions right away or place their responses along with any other feedback and/or concerns in our suggestion box. Having a suggestion box at national quiz was a great way for members to express their concerns, comments, suggestions and ideas anonymously. By having this at a national event we were able to reach a wider population of Canadian Pony Club members. This was also a way for members to feel like their ideas are being heard. Here is a summary of the information we collected:
